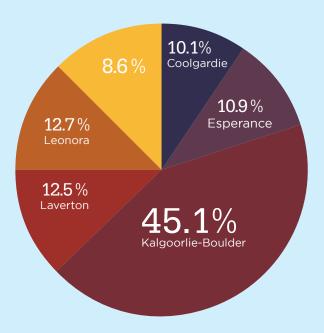

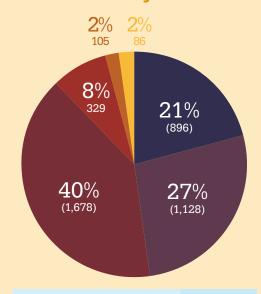

# Sector Highlights

#### Resources

With around \$14 billion in mining sector output per annum, the region's mineral deposits underpin much of the economy, particularly gold and nickel mining. The local mining industry expands well beyond extraction to also include METS services, exploration, processing, equipment development, education and research.

The local gold sector has performed strongly in recent years. Australian gold mine production is forecast to grow at an average annual rate of 5.7% between 2020–21 and 2023–24<sup>3</sup>. Growth is expected to be driven by mine reactivation and expansions, as well as production from new mines.

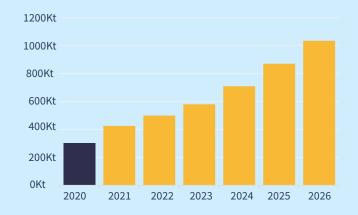
Several Goldfields-Esperance gold projects are expected to ramp up production in the coming years, including St Barbara's Gwalia Expansion and the AngloGold Ashanti-Independence Group Tropicana Expansion project.

#### **Agriculture and Food**

The Goldfields-Esperance region has a significant agricultural and pastoral sector and a commercial seafood industry. This activity is concentrated in the southern part of the region with pastoral leases throughout the northern region. Broadacre crops, particularly wheat, barley and canola, are the region's most valuable agricultural commodities. ABARES notes that Australian wheat prices are now competitive compared with other origin wheat, providing an opportunity for local producers to regain market share in traditional export markets<sup>4</sup>. Australian barley exports are also expected to remain competitive in international markets. Producers in the region are exploring diversification to meet emerging markets such as consumer demand for alternative proteins.

# **World Lithium Demand Outlook:** Calendar years

The Goldfields-Esperance region has globally significant reserves of lithium and other key battery minerals used in EV and energy storage applications. Demand for these materials is forecast to grow strongly in the coming years. Additionally, the region is the largest global producer of rare earth elements (REE) after China.
